# COUNT AND NON-COUNT NOUNS

Count nouns in plural				
Rules	Examples			
Ending in <i>-s</i> , <i>-sh</i> , <i>-ch</i> , or <i>-x</i> , add <i>-es</i>	glasses, squashes, peaches, boxes			
Ending in <i>-o</i> , usually add <i>-es</i>	potato <mark>es</mark> , tomato <mark>es</mark> , mango <mark>es</mark>			
Ending in consonant + -y, change to -ies	berry–berr <mark>ies</mark> , candy–cand <b>ies</b> , party–part <b>ies</b>			
Ending in <i>-f</i> or <i>-fe</i> , change to <i>-ves</i>	loaf-loa <b>ves</b> , half-hal <b>ves</b> , knife-kni <b>ves</b>			
Irregular plurals	man- <mark>men</mark> , woman- <mark>women</mark> , person-people, child-children			

Common non-count nouns			
Groups	Examples		
Liquids	water, milk, juice, tea, coffee		
Grains	cereal, rice, wheat, corn		
Powders	sugar, salt, pepper, flour		
Meat	chicken, ham, poultry, steak		
Other	cake, bread, pasta, ice cream, cheese		

- You use a / an for count nouns in singular.
- Don't use a / an for count nouns in plural or for non-count nouns.
- Non-count nouns don't have a plural form.

- Use these quantifiers with the plural forms of count nouns: a lot of vegetables, some cookies, a few eggs, any tomatoes.
- Use some when you talk about an unspecified quantity, instead of a specific number: some ham.

• Add –ing to most verbs. If the verb ends in –e, eliminate the –e before adding –ing: make–making.

If the verb ends in a consonant + vowel + consonant, double the consonant and add –ing: run–running.
